Siletz Public Library is OPEN!

On March 2nd we opened for limited browsing Tuesday-Friday from 10-4. We ask that you don't bring the whole family at this point -- we can currently only have 10 people in the library at a time, so this gives more people a chance to browse. Social distancing and face covers are required. If you can't wear a mask, we will continue curbside service upon request! Browsing sessions are limited to 30 minutes per person, once per day. We can't wait to see you!

We are thrilled to get our books, movies, magazines, and music CDs into the hands of our local users. Currently, we have the following at the library (approximate numbers): 15,400 books, including adult, young adult, and youth and children's fiction and non-fiction; 2000 DVDs and VHS tapes for adults and children; subscriptions to 30 magazines which are available for checkout;

two regular newspapers which are for in-library use; and a Native American collection which contains roughly 450 books.

Besides these materials which reside at the Siletz Library, we have access to many, many more from the other libraries in the Chinook Library Network. Our courier makes the rounds between libraries several times a week delivering items requested by our local patrons. In addition, there are digital resources available at our catalog website- www.chinooklibraries.org. You can find databases with research articles, audio and ebooks, and helpful resources like *Mango Languages* and the genealogy site *Heritage Quest*. The new Siletz Public Library building opened 1/6/2007, 14 years ago.

A Trip Down Memory Lane: 2004

The excited talk of the night on June 17th, 2004, at the Siletz Valley Friends of the Library annual membership meeting was the \$100,000 pledge from the Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians toward our Siletz Public Library Building fund!

The article below was originally published in our October 2004 newsletter. The Tribe's pledge was an important turning point for our library fundraising efforts. At the June 2004 membership meeting, Karen Carlson explained that we needed to have \$500,000 in commitments by December, 2004, as a condition of a Collins Foundation grant. The Tribe's pledge met 20% of that requirement but it also showed other foundations that we had the community behind us. With the Tribe's demonstrated support, we were able to secure additional grants from the Ford Family Foundation, Meyer Memorial Trust, Paul G Allen Family Foundation and Oregon Community Foundation. We met our \$500,000 goal!

Confederated Tribes of Siletz Indians Donates \$100,000 to Siletz Library Building Fund

Siletz Tribal Council announced their pledge of \$100,000 toward the building of a new library in a June 18th ceremony. In her letter to **SVFOL** President Sally Jennings, Tribal Chairman Delores Pigsley said "The Confederated Tribes of Siletz recognizes the importance of a library to all community members, and understands the urgent need of the foundation to raise funds to replace the current building." Chairman Pigsley also stated that she hoped **SVFOL** could use this pledge to leverage additional resources.

The Siletz Tribe has been continuously supportive of **SVFOL** efforts to help our local library. The **CTSI** Charitable Contributions Board has awarded grants for an outside book drop which is currently installed at the existing library and can be moved to the new library when it is built; funds to cover the cost of liability insurance; and funds to purchase large print books for the library. In addition, Tina Retasket, Assistant General Manager for the Tribe, has generously shared her grant-writing expertise with **SVFOL**'s grant committee members.

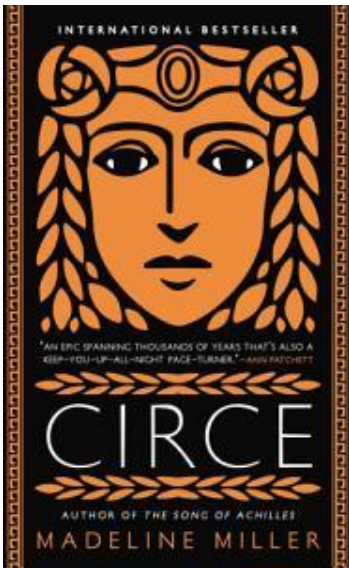
Chairman Pigsley's hope that the Siletz Tribal pledge could be leveraged has already been realized: The Ford Family Foundation matched the Tribal pledge with a \$100,000 commitment in early July.

In an email to **SVFOL** members, President Sally Jennings said, "I am overwhelmed with happiness. I believe the support of the Tribe will open the way for the rest of the funding of the library project to come together."
